SCAN IS NOW AVAILABLE FOR YOU TO READ ONLINE, THANKS TO OUR SHERINGTON WEBMASTER: IAN COLLINGE:

Here is Ian's helpful guide to those of you who are not familiar with all the technical procedures (which includes me! Betty, Editor, P.S. <u>YOU WILL STILL RECEIVE YOUR NORMAL COPY OF SCAN, FREE OF CHARGE, THROUGH THE LETTERBOX)</u>

To make it as easy as possible for you to access SCAN online, we've made it available on two websites ('sherington.org.uk' and 'issuu.com') and in three different formats. Just choose whichever you find most convenient from the following options:

Use the link <u>www.sherington.org.uk/scan</u> to take you directly to the SCAN page where you will see three links to the current issue: **'PDF version'**, **'Word version'**, **'ISSUU version'**. Just click on the one you prefer. If you are not a 'computer geek' and do not understand technical terms such as 'PDF', don't worry, just click on each one and see what happens, then use the one you like best.

You can copy the PDF or Word versions to your own computer (for example, if you want to read it later) by **right-clicking** on the link (i.e. use the right button on your mouse instead of the left one) and then choose 'Save Target As..." from the pop-up menu. You can also print SCAN out to your own printer if you wish.

As well as the latest issue, you can access any previous online issues. Those available are listed in the right-hand column of the SCAN page.

If you are already on the Sherington web site, you will find 'SCAN' is now in the main menu at the top of each page. You can use that to go to the SCAN page, or access the latest issue.

You can also access SCAN on the ISSUU website by going to <u>issuu.com/sherington</u> This is the Sherington home page and you will see pictures of the available SCAN issues across the middle of your screen. Just click on the one you wish to read. ISSUU is a global web site which now claims to have 10 million publications.

Mandy is in Israel so Pam writes......

By the time you read this Easter will all be over, but I hope you had a lovely time.

Believers all over the world have been attending special services all though Holy Week recalling the events which led up to the Friday when Jesus was crucified. That was the hideous fate which befell many under the Roman Empire, but few, I imagine, asked God to forgive those who were driving nails through his hands and feet.

The following Sunday the tomb was empty, Jesus was alive; barely believing their senses, people saw him, touched him, spoke with him! Various explanations for what happened have been put forward. Some of them are plausible – maybe Jesus' friends came and stole the body – despite the guard set by Pilate, but many of them died for their faith and they would hardly have done that knowing such a vital part of it was a lie. Other explanations are frankly ridiculous, for instance that Jesus, not dead but only fainting, revived in the cool of the tomb, pushed the heavy stone away from the inside and escaped. I won't go into the horrors which Jesus endured, except to say that the Romans were particularly efficient at killing their victims and knew a dead body when they saw one. Jesus forgave those who were torturing him, and he came back from the dead, not insubstantial like a ghost but solid, eating and drinking with his astounded friends. Christians not only believe it but will tell you that they too experience his presence in their daily lives.

I know it is tempting to dismiss such thoughts as ridiculous or even rather pathetic. I know too that many must be put off and disgusted by the activities of those who have abused their position within the Church, but the appalling behaviour of a few is no reason to dismiss the whole thing. Christianity is a way of life which has to be seen, experienced personally. Jesus' friends weren't gullible idiots; they didn't expect to see him again once his body was sealed in a tomb; they were not convinced until they saw him for themselves. Even then it was often not until he said or did something which was so strikingly familiar that they could let go of their natural disbelief and grasp the extraordinary truth.

Christianity is mysterious but also deeply practical; instructions about how to live together with the help of Jesus' presence abound in the New Testament. 'As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another, and ...forgive each other... Above all clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony....'

(Col. 3 12-14)

Sounds a pretty good recipe for life to me! Belatedly, Happy Easter!

When I was old enough to start using the pub we enjoyed a very social time with great nights in the domino and skittles leagues – Laura would often join in the banter against the opposition, making it hard for them to beat the home team. 

ORTH CRAWLEY SCAN NEWS AND COMMENT

Do you remember those warm days with plenty of sunshine early in March, with national media declaring Spring had been sprung. It was a welcome relief after a long cold spell but seemed a little premature to believe that the weather was going to continue warming and so it has proved. The recent weather reminds me of Scandinavia especially Sweden, where I just happened to visit on a number of occasions at the request of my employers. Thinking back, not sure anyone else wanted to go there in winter, but for me challenging environments are quite exciting, and my hosts always made me feel welcome. Very cold, sometimes sunny days, but sleet and snow never far away, which suddenly sweeps in without warning. The difference is the Swedes are used to it and I'm not sure we are. Anyway back to North Crawley where during one of the better days a visit to the allotment seemed a good idea. Mixed success with the over-winter crops, most of the garlic had not only survived but showed strong growth. On the downside only a quarter of the onions survived, the rest being withered and of less bulk than when planted. That's the way it goes I guess, and listening to some farmers about their crops, the weather has been pretty harsh on them too.

On an upbeat note the Institute Committee staged a marvellous evening's entertainment on 2nd March. The village was visited by a group of musicians known as the 'Bolivian Sunshine Dogs', some of whom are quite local to us. The range of instruments played was amazing and the sound at times quite startling. From memory there was a keyboard, euphonium/tuba, saw & bow, spoons, ukulele, drums, guitar (electric and acoustic), violin, kazoo, trombone, double bass, and other gadgets that made strange noises. The lead singer/magician/comedian kept things bubbling along, and it was a really good night out. Well done the IMC for organising the event.

Traffic Calming/Residential safety.


Despite being very disappointed at being told the village is back to a re-assessment situation, rather than the implementation scenario envisaged, some small signs of progress can be seen. In Folly Lane two road signs have been applied to the road surface to highlight there is a crossing point leading to Church Walk and the school. and the High Street to measure both volume and speed. All the Parish Council can do is keep trying their best and hope someone at MKC will listen.

NORTH CRAWLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met on Tuesday 5th March, 2013

New Councillor

Jo Small was welcomed as our new Councillor following her successful application.

Planning

No new applications this month, however the previous decision to refuse change of use for the shop is being appealed by the applicant. Comments will be passed to the relevant department in MKC.

Ward Councillors Report

Keith McLean confirmed that £200 from his ward budget has been allocated to the St. Firmin's clock restoration project for which he received thanks from the PC.

A number of changes are taking place within MKC as part of a restructuring exercise, these include proposals for :

- planning department will reduce the amount of time from application receipt to decision. This
 also requires training PC members so they can assist in the process.
- The system for recording and tracking issues raised is being updated over the next nine months. This should provide much greater visibility of the issue status.

MKC are preparing a funding application for SID equipment (traffic speed monitoring), all Parish Councils are being contacted to understand the level of interest.

Trees

The weather has not allowed any of the proposed work to be completed this month, this is now expected to complete in March.

Domestic Gas Supply

Councillor Hatton has gone to great lengths to establish whether it would be possible to provide a domestic gas supply, and the likely costs of this. National Grid have provided estimates, which show that if all houses in the village wanted to proceed, this would cost in the region of three to five thousand pounds each for the connection (but does not include the cost of pipework on each property plus the cost of each boiler and meter). A lower uptake would see the price per household increase, although National Grid made it clear that they require a minimum of 40% uptake. It was obvious to all that the price is restrictive and that National Grid clearly would only proceed at no cost to them, even in the short term.

Drains

MKC are still discussing possible solutions and access with North Crawley Estates.

Finance Prinary

A total of £1,8886.97 had been spent in the previous month, all to cover expected items included within the precept. There were no receipts.

Applications have been made for two additional bank signatories, this is proceeding.

Churchyard

It was agreed that an overgrowing lime tree will be cut back by a team of Councillors when the weather permits.

Disappointment was expressed at how small an area will be treated considering the state of disrepair of large sections of this road, however this is in line with MKC's approach to remain within budget via a process of 'little and often'. It was agreed that MKC be asked to detail the number of vehicle damage claims have been received due to the condition of the road, this could potentially be used to strengthen our case for more work to be carried out.

The Parish Council are preparing a priorities list of Traffic Calming measures to send on to MKC, in the meantime Rachel Kingsley (the head of the relevant department in MKC) has been invited to visit the village in order to understand the traffic problems we face. It is still not clear if any of the money that was originally allocated to traffic calming will actually be available.

Resident Items

It was highlighted that the footpath and grass verge between East End and the High Street is in a poor state of repair. It was agreed that MKC be contacted in order to address this problem.

The next meeting will take place in the Village Hall on Tuesday 9th April, at 7:30pm. This is a change to the scheduled date due to the Easter Bank Holiday.

DOG WALKERS AND OWNERS IN SHERINGTON

DO YOU WANT TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR BLINDING A CHILD or making another person, or pet, seriously ill?

We assume the answer to this is no. If this is the case, then why is there so very much dog mess littering our streets, pavements and grass verges?

The amount of dog mess on our pavements is a health hazard to the residents of the village, particularly those not old enough to look for, and avoid, it. There is frequently dog mess right outside Sherington CE School and on the popular routes to Sherington Preschool and the park.

It's also a bit of an embarrassment. Visitors to the village must be disgusted and amazed that we do not take any pride in our environment.

- Please, please take the necessary steps to clean up after your dog(s) at all times and not just in the day-time when you think someone might be watching.
- Please try to ensure all dog-walkers in your household are doing the same.
- Please don't allow your dogs to wander alone around the village fouling the pavements and park.

Dog waste is similar in composition to sewage and we'd all be very quick to complain if our streets were littered in that. Moreover, dog mess on the ground can affect the quality of the water in local steams and rivers, and cause disease amongst livestock.

TAPEWORM, E.COLI, ROUNDWORM, CAMPYLOBACTER & TOXOCARIASIS can all be carried in dog waste.

Please bag it and bin it before someone is seriously affected.

We have alerted the Dog Warden to this problem but please do consider reporting any dog-fouling offenders directly to Milton Keynes Council or the police and, in the case of stray or wandering dogs, maybe consider contacting the RSPCA or the Milton Keynes Council Dog Wardens.

SHERINGTON SYNOPSIS BY JACK DAW



Well, it seems that last month's Scan has only just been delivered but it is already time to write for the April edition. Seriously though you will have been aware of the tardiness of

March Scan which apparently was due to a major breakdown of the printing machine and so it ended up being some 10 days late. Hopefully this month's will be back to the normal delivery time.

We had a couple of days in early March when I really thought that spring had arrived, the sun was really warm and I went so far as to put up our parasol on the patio. Shortly afterwards the rain came back along with strong winds and the parasol took to the air! It has been really wet once more and currently the fields along Newport Road are yet again flooded, Whilst walking across the play area by the Village Hall I was surprised to see how much standing water there is on the ground, a sure sign that the land must be completely waterlogged. We did manage a bit of digging of the vegetable patch recently but it still needs a lot more work before we can even consider putting things into the ground and the temperatures are generally a bit disappointing.

I saw a very unusual sight on 6th March, a red kite in the sky above my garden. I have seen plenty of these around the Wendover area but never up here before. It circled around for while before disappearing over Carters Close but then it reappeared and looked to be heading towards Newport Pagnell. At first I thought that there were two of them but then I noticed that the second bird was much smaller and appeared to be attacking the kite. It was too far away to tell for certain but I assume that the smaller bird may have been a kestrel or sparrowhawk taking exception to another predator on its territory. In talking to a friend of mine who is a bit of a twitcher he said that as well as kites being re-introduced south of here they had also been introduced in the Rutland area and the signs are that the two regions are beginning to join up so we may see more in the future.

My comments about Hazelmead Farm has produced a couple of responses. Julie Smith told me that she had noticed a sign for the farm while out on her bike going north on the High Street on the left hand side, it appears that it was the land as tended by Miss Hill when she was alive. It was also mentioned to me that I could have found the information on the historical society website. However, not everyone has a computer and it should not be necessary to have to use such a machine to locate a place, to my mind if a place does not have a postcode then it is not a valid address. It would surely have been better to have said that the High Street would be closed from its junction with

The Knoll (Church Road does not actually extend down as far as the High Street) to the 30 limit signs to the north, then everyone would know what would be affected. As it is nothing happened on 4th March and it still hasn't as of 19th March. In case you are wondering the road is supposed to be being resurfaced.

As you may have gathered news is somewhat thin on the ground this month but perhaps more will have happened next month.

7 WHITE HART LICENCE VARIATION APPLICATION

After the February meeting the chairman met with a representative from the White Hart. The parish council then sent the following response to the consultation:- "Sherington Parish Council considered the licensing application at its meeting on 5th February 2013 and is aware of the views of some residents who are opposed to the application. The Parish Council is keen to balance the viability of the pub (so that it remains an essential part of village life) and the amenity of residents. We consider that the Committee should also balance these factors. The PC suggests that there is a compromise position which reduces all the proposed extensions of hours by 30 minutes and places appropriate limitations on music played outside"

8 MKC ELECTORAL REVIEW

It was agreed to reaffirm Sherington Parish Council's wish to remain in a single councillor ward but also to submit reasons to support this request.

9 SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE (SID)

The local NAG (Neighbourhood Action Group) is interested in redeploying SIDs but the parish council questioned the overall effectiveness of the devices and therefore did not support the additional suggestion of having to source and contribute funding in order to install, manage and maintain them.

10 PUBLIC ACCESS DATABASE

Ward Cllr McLean reported that a new Public Access Database has been created at MKC so that the public can report, access and track any environmental issues raised. It is hoped that a demonstration will be available at the June NECAF meeting.

11 DATES OF NEXT MEETINGS

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7.30pm on Tuesday 2nd April 2013. The **Annual Parish Meeting** will be held on Tuesday 7th May in the Village Hall commencing at **7 pm**, followed by the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council at 7.30pm.

SHERINGTON PRE-SCHOOL NEWS MARCH 2013

We're delighted to say that all the new children have settled into our Pre-school routine and we continue to receive new enquiries. Places are fast being filled so, if you would like your child to attend Sherington Pre-school, please do register your interest using the contact details below.

Over the last few weeks the children have been very industrious indeed. Activities have included making delicious rock cakes which were enjoyed after a super healthy snack of baked beans with toast. We continue to offer a variety of fresh fruit and other healthy options at the snack bar and we ask that our parents consider contributing to this through our Wishing Tree scheme.

At the snack bar, children are heartily encouraged to choose what they prefer to eat and to pour their own drinks. This helps them become independent and assists in their physical development and coordination.

We are pleased to report that we recently had a visit from Miss Angela Lea of Sherington CE School. Miss Lea, who herself attended Sherington Preschool in 1998, popped in to introduce herself to the children, join in the mornings activities and read them some stories. During the summer term, we intend to make plenty of visits to the local schools which will enable our older children to become accustomed to their new environments ready for a smooth transition to big school in September.

Our theme, 'Under the Sea' has been a huge success and has presented us with some wonderful new experiences for learning and discovery. Large wooden blocks have been turned into boats of different shapes and sizes. The story, 'Rainbow Fish' allowed the children to understand the importance of sharing and inspired creative work which subsequently developed into a beautiful collage now displayed in the hall. Children were encouraged to paint their hands in different colours and use the prints to make colourful rainbow fish. Lentils, sand and rice introduced them to textures similar to those of star fish and sea urchins. The children thoroughly enjoyed exploring lovely bubbly water and playing with a variety sea creatures. The latter really helped to develop and expand their vocabulary and it was pleasing to discover that sharks are still everyones favourite!

For Mother's Day, the children created wonderfully individual art work by drawing pictures of their Mums. The children showed an abundance of

creativity and imagination and went into great detail, some drawing their Mums in a garden filled with beautiful flowers. The activity was observed to see how the child held the pen and in which hand. Such observations are an important part of the EYFS and serve to highlight and help us record each child's stage of Physical Development.

Upon return from the Easter holidays, we will venture out to Tom's Garden to prepare our buckets for planting. We plan to base our 3rd year of, 'Homegrown in Sherington' on the story, 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. This will be reinforced as our main theme for the first few weeks of term. We aim to develop many areas of the children's learning using this story so will be exploring; how the children react to a new learning environment, using elements of a new story to introduce children to new vocabulary, whether the children are able to handle gardening tools and encouraging them to make marks (e.g leave a letter or a picture for the Giant in the garden). This theme will further develop numeracy through counting, for example, how many beans we are planting. Importantly, we will be observing how the children show care and concern for the living things they may find in the garden such as worms, spiders or lady birds. They will also be exploring the colour and texture of different materials they experience in the garden.



Finally, a huge thank you to all the marvellous eggheads who supported our Sherington Easter Fundraising Quiz. More than 50 people took part as teams competed to win an egg-celent prize. A total of £383 was raised for Pre-school funds and the winning
