

Mandy writes.....

This month I would like to share the story of Isaac's carol recorded in a Christian resources Compilation called Hay and Stardust, by Ruth Burgess.

In 2003, Malvern Churches asked John L Bell if he would judge a carol writing competition which was open to three age ranges – Primary School, Secondary School and adults. Entries were to be set to a well known Welsh carol tune. Around 60 manuscripts were sent. There were w few good entries but nothing outstanding until John came across a supplementary batch at the back which consisted of material which didn't quite fit the bill, most often because it didn't go to the prescribed tune. That was where Isaac's carol appeared. It seemed a totally unaffected expression of love for Jesus, and it stood in stark contrast to everything else.

So John decided to give it First Prize, even if it didn't meet all the criteria.... and then discovered that the author didn't meet the criteria either for Isaac Hutchings was only three and a half, too young even for the Primary class.

Isaac's mother wrote to say that there had been considerable interest in his achievement but Isaac couldn't understand why the newspapers and radio wanted to interview him. He just wanted to play.... presumably at Bob the Builder. Here is Isaac's carol....

Father God I love you and your little Jesus. I would like to kiss him and give him a cuddle. I would share all my toys And play lots of games with him. Bob the Builder we could play; We would be the best of mates.

What Isaac expressed, certainly better than I could, was a simple but profound love for Jesus and a willingness and a desire for Jesus to be part of his life and if that meant asking Jesus to play Bob the Builder well all to the good. Christmas, after all, is about God's Son Jesus coming to earth to be with us, in our playing, in our working, in our living, to be the 'best of mates'. I wonder will you open your hearts to Jesus this Christmas and discover Emmanuel – God with us?

May you be touched by the love and peace of Jesus Christ this Christmas. God Bless, Mandy.

ASTWOOD & HARDMEAD PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

Held on Wednesday 29th October 2014 at 8pm in Astwood Village Hall 5/14

Present: Cllrs M Powell-Shedden, C Mitchell, D Chapman, R Stilton, Clerk P Reynolds-Nunn, Ward Cllrs K McLean, P Geary & D Hosking, PCSO R Michel, Martyn Smith of MK Council, 3 members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr Hulance, apologies accepted.

Minutes of the meeting on 13th August 2014 were adopted and signed as a true record with one small amendment.

Super fast broadband roll-out

Martyn Smith came to speak to us regarding this issue. Contrary to hearsay there is no broadband fibre along the A422, the nearest connection is 2 miles away in Gog Lane, North Crawley, but there is to be a project in 2016 called "fibre to the remote known" which will provide much faster broadband; it could be sooner if there are any funds left because there is a 20% clawback to be reinvested in the network.

Matters arising from the last meeting-

Hedge pruning on A422 still needs attention on both sides when pulling out from Astwood, Clerk to deal with.

Pot holes in Cranfield Rd, Astwood still bad, Clerk to chase.

Traffic Issues:

Miranda had walked around with a member of the highways department at MK Council to point out to him our main concerns, which are pulling out of Astwood onto the A422 and also at the Hardmead Turn. Regarding Astwood it is clear that keeping the hedges cut well back regularly makes a big difference to vision and safety when pulling out. The Hardmead Turn is only dangerous when speeds are exceeded more than 60mph. It was suggested that speed tubes put down may help; also Miranda will speak at the next NAG meeting for more or better signage along the A422 when approaching the Hardmead Turn. Clerk will speak to MK Council to ask them to cut the hedges well back and also to a resident to ask how much hedge they would be prepared to trim in order to improve vision.

Hardmead Play Area – Cllr Stilton reported that he had been busy therefore this project had been put on hold for a while. The main problem is raising 50% ourselves but he was advised

to contact Heather Baker or Rob Ward or Phil Snell to check if the funding they had agreed is still available. It was mentioned that we can apply to MK Community Foundation for a grant as well. Our Ward Councillors agreed to help with this and will support our mission for grants if CIIr Stilton copies them all in to emails. He was advised to apply via email to MKCF, and the Hockey Foundation (possibly would need to include a basketball net to comply)

Village Hall Report – Cllr Hulance had prepared a report which the Clerk read out. The harvest supper had raised over £600 and the recent improvements to the hall are being felt. New windows are being considered and it was suggested the Parish Council may be able to claim back the VAT element of the cost. The Clerk will check on the legality of this and report back. Cllr Mitchell mentioned that there could be some more funds available from the Community Benefit Fund and if so, he could apply for some to be used towards the cost of new windows. The car park next to the Close was covered in the Ward Councillor's report to follow.

Ward Cllr's report – Keith McLean and David Hosking and Peter Geary all gave us a brief report on items relevant.

The Minerals Local Plan consultation ends on 5th November 2014 and it was mentioned that if a certain proposal was agreed it would generate more traffic along the A422.

The planning strategy would not have a huge effect on rural areas.

The car park was mentioned in Main Rd, Astwood regarding MK Council selling it. Cllr Geary reported that there are no plans to sell this piece of land at present but there could be in the future should they need to boost their income by selling bits of ground. Peter explained that there would always be a consultation before this took place.

Cllr Hosking noted that Hardmead do not receive the "Phone Box" magazine although Astwood does. He will look into this on our behalf as it is worth reading. Cllr McLean reported that there is now a new email address for the three ward councilors which is <u>Olneyward@milton-keynes.gov.uk</u>

The NE Forum is on 4th December 2014 at Weston Underwood.

Mike Hainge is to action a ward visit on 19th November2014 so we were advised to let them know if we have any issues to mention.

<u>NAG</u> – Neighbourhood Action Group update – had been dealt with earlier and no recent meeting had taken place.

Planning:

There were two planning applications to be looked at.

- 1.)7&8 Turvey Rd, Astwood new dwelling and renovation of the cottages for guest house and storage, no adverse comments
- 2.) Manor Farm, Hardmead barn for conversion, looking into as planning system complicated and needs refreshing.

Finances:

Clerk's salary was reviewed and agreed an increase of £100 p.a. with effect from January 2015. It was also resolved to pay £120 p.a. to the internal auditor for pay roll work which the Clerk has been covering up to now, with immediate effect, all in favour.

Councillor's Items:

PCSO Ryan Michel was called away so gave a very quick update, mainly to warn us to be extra <u>vigilant now the dark nights are upon us. Cllr Mitchell told him about cars</u> racing around Hardmead between 1-2am recently near Church Farm; he advised to ring and report other similar incidents on 101.

AOB / Questions from the public.

Some villagers have shown concern regarding St. Peters church being for sale. This is not a Parish Council matter but anyone wanting more information is welcome to contact Howard Cattermoll of the Oxford Diocese on 01865 208200 who is happy to receive calls. There is the war memorial inside the church which residents would like to move and site elsewhere should the church be sold; Clerk will look into this and report back.

A light is flickering opposite 5/7 Cranfield Road, Astwood, Clerk to action.

On Remembrance Sunday 9th November 35 of we villagers gathered at the War Memorial for a short service and the laying of a poppy wreath. The service was conducted by Professor John Fielding with the wreath laid and exhortation given by Mr. Chris Errington assisted by Miss Jessica Sparshot. The service then continued in the church with the Reverend Mandy Marriott.

From my observations and our farmers reports the winter crops are now all planted in the fields and the annual battle with slugs is underway. The wet, cool weather has arrived; will it I wonder be similar to last winter? I read somewhere that the meteorological service now have an even more powerful computer that will assist in producing more accurate weather forecasts. Should we be sceptical? NORTH CRAWLEY SCAN NEWS AND COMMENT.

The first piece of news is about something that didn't happen during November or to be more precise on the fifth of November. One of our older residents Mr Bill Maslin has pursued an interesting hobby for many years; in fact a figure of 66 years was mentioned. The hobby demonstrates an incredible knowledge of chemistry and pyrotechnics which result in the most fantastic fireworks. Nothing has ever been advertised about viewing the product of his endeavour and ingenuity, but over the years friends and groups of villagers have ventured onto his property on the fifth of November and witnessed amazing explosions and colourful displays on the fields to the rear of his house. All that have seen and heard his amazing creations will never forget the experience, and stories abound as to how he acquired his knowledge. Unfortunately Bill has been unwell of late, so it seems his fireworks will become part of village history which is a great shame, and those who have witnessed the spectacular sights that have lit up our evening skies on the fifth of November should feel privileged to have done so. There are a number of people who are currently trying to get Bill some formal recognition for his contributions towards our village, and I'm sure we all wish them every success in this venture.

Having recently spent a short while in the south of Ireland, I was reflecting on some of the differences found in the small rural community there when compared to our own. An often emotive and continuous topic of conversation in North Crawley concerns roads, what travels them, signage, parking and state of repair. Well in the area just visited these appear to be something that has to be put up with, but not worthy of too much attention. The comment I heard which summed up the rural roads was "don't buy a second hand car here, because they're badly shook up". Tractors and farm machinery are many, always seem to on the roads and are just about impossible to get around, plus the odd horse and cart suddenly appears often driven by kids, which are very tricky to overtake. The attitude towards parking in the local town is also pretty relaxed, an example being double yellow lines, which appear to be an invitation to double-park, no-one bats an eyelid, and traffic saunters along at between 10 to 20 m.p.h. It made me wonder whether encouraging our farmers to get their machinery out on the roads a bit more often and turning a blind-eye to a bit of chaotic parking in the High Street and Folly Lane, would actually be a better deterrent for reducing traffic volumes and slowing speeding motorists, than the solution recently implemented by Milton Keynes Council.

The following is a moving account of a recent trip by the North Crawley Historical Society to World War 1 battlefields.

The Battlefields Tour Report October 23rd 2014

As everyone knows, this year sees the one hundredth anniversary of the start of World War One. Our Historical Society has already staged an important, and very moving, tribute to the 106 men (and records of the contribution of 3 women) from our village who served in the UK Forces during the conflict which changed our world for ever. We feel especially for the 25 of those men who did not return.

In late October thirteen of our members took part in a guided battlefields tour, visiting, and learning about, both the Ypres Salient in Belgium, and key areas of the July 1st 1916 Somme offensive mounted by the British army with such sacrifice, courage, and selflessness. We experienced many poignant and emotional occasions and places, Tyne Cot cemetery, Passchendaele, Sanctuary Wood and Hill 62, the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate, Thiepval and the Schwaben Redoubt, and the overcast weather seemed to catch the mood (there were lighter moments too!). We stood where the actual attack at White City trenches was filmed by David Maitland (who was blown off his feet by the preparatory mine explosion), and were shocked and saddened to discover that what we had thought was staged cinema was in fact real.

So lots to reflect on, and we were all deeply affected by the experiences. For the writer the most telling moments were when we found the grave of Henry Ager in Ypres Town Cemetery, the names of Arthur Ementon and Walter Riddy on the Tyne Cott wall of remembrance, and Leonard Fulford, Harry Ruffhead, and Owen Young on the Somme Thiepval Memorial (these five have no known grave). We laid a cross for each. We never knew them, but we know their families, and we walk the same paths and fields; somehow this knowledge created a bridge across the years.

NORTH CRAWLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Council met on Tuesday 4th November, 2014

<u>Planning</u>

Two applications to consider this month;

- 7 High Street, side extension. No adverse comments.
- 26 Orchard Way, two storey side extension (resubmission). No adverse comments.

Grass Cutting Contract

Received tenders require clarification, so a decision for next year's contract will now be made in the December meeting. The delayed decision has no adverse effect.

Ward Councillor's Report (Cllr Hosking and Cllr McLean (part))

Our 3 Ward Councillors are chasing the MKC Service Director for progress on a number of issues that affect the village :

- The pavements in the High Street,
- Pot hole in Brooke End
- Folly Lane white lining

They asked for patience from our Parish Council as they pursue all three matters at a senior level.

The Ward Councillors provided direction to the PC in relation to both the current and future grass cutting contracts. Cllr Hatton will discuss with the relevant department in MKC.

The next MK North East forum is scheduled for early December. Councillors from NCPC will attend.

A 'Plan MK' drop-in session is scheduled for 12th November.

Residential Safety

MKC, along with Thames Valley Police, are reviewing the current 40mph speed limit in Brook End after being alerted by the PC. A decision is anticipated in early December.

In connection with the Brook End speed limit, the width of the road was discussed, particularly as there are a high number of wider vehicles crossing the white lines as they travel around the bends. Cllr Hatton will contact MKC to discuss whether the road could be straightened or widened, however, it was accepted that this should be taken into account of the speed limit on this stretch of road. This point was also raised by a member of the public who recalls conversation from previous PC meetings.

The Ford Project

The PC is still evaluating options in relation to cleaning out the debris from the Ford. **NAG Report**

The next NAG meeting was scheduled for the day following the PC meeting,

however, Cllr Hunt updated the meeting with the recent road speed data collection activities. SIDs machines have been used recently, these collect speed data which will be analysed and will contribute to road speed decisions by MKC and Thames Valley Police.

Cllr Hunt undertook to raise at the NAG meeting the issue of cars parking on pavements, particularly on the High Street at the Eastern edge of the village.

Finance

Payments over the past month total £959.69, all to cover expected items. Receipts totalled £11.00 (one NC map).

Churchyard

A request has been received for a remembrance stone to include a small, coloured motif. A decision will be made when the size and placement of the design are understood.

It appears that the churchyard rules and regulations are not being followed in terms of the placing of ornaments and flower pots placed on and around graves and remembrance stones. It was proposed that the existing rules should be simplified and issued not only to funeral directors (for distribution), but also to all applicants. Additionally, it was also decided to serve notice that any unauthorised items should be removed by the end of January 2015, following which the PC will remove (and store) any such items.

New Notice Boards

It was agreed to order new notice boards to house village maps for the outside of the Institute and the Churchyard.

Landscape

Work has been completed on cutting back the trees in the churchyard – all agreed that the quality of the work is outstanding. Further work to churchyard trees, the hedge around the garden of rest, plus three benches has been agreed.

Councillor Items

The village shop owner has applied for a Post Office licence. All agreed that the shop is a real asset to the village and would like to pass on thanks to the new owner.

The next meeting will take place in the Village Hall on Tuesday 2nd December, at 7:30pm.
