**Easter 2014**

*Sex and drugs and rock and roll  
Is all my brain and body need  
Sex and drugs and rock and roll are very good indeed.*

So sang Ian Drury in his memorable song. Not so long ago sex and drugs at least would have been taboo subjects. Nowadays there is not much which isn't taboo to speak about in public. Celebrities line up on chat shows to talk about their addictions or that they have 'come out'. Non celebrities fill the long hours of daytime TV broadcasting to anyone who will listen, about how dysfunctional their relationships are, or having paternity tests because the Dad could be one of two or more people. Anything goes, or so it would seem, if it feels good do it. There is no right or wrong. But there is one taboo left at least that people don't want to talk about – death, let alone what happens after death. Eat drink and be merry for tomorrow you die, is the philosophy of many today.

We are just emerging from one of the wettest winters ever in this country, yet spring has come, the trees have blossomed, the flowers have emerged, the days are lengthening, and the temperature is rising. Spring is in the air. Yet as surely as eggs are eggs, summer will come, autumn will come and then winter and death. The seasons surely are a metaphor for our own lives. Just as surely as we were born, so too will we die. As Ecclesiastes 3 says:

*'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens:  
A time to be born and a time to die...'*

At this season of Easter we might take a moment to reflect on our lives. We only have one life. Am I happy with my life? Where am I going? What's the point? What will happen when I die? These are all big questions and ones we can avoid, by being busy, by working too much, by seeking pleasure in sex or drugs or rock and roll, or whatever your vice is. But at some point life, or often death, will come and slap us round the face and say 'Wake up, what are you doing with your life?' This often happens at a crisis in our lives. It might be when a loved one dies, or we become sick, or our kids leave home, or we retire, and suddenly our purpose in life is gone. Then we have a choice. We can try and carry on as before, we can try and medicate the pain away with drugs or alcohol or some other vice, or we can stop, and think and maybe even pray.

At Easter time we remember that Jesus came into this world, he died an excruciatingly painful death on a cross, was buried, but then rose again from the dead on the third day. We are so familiar with the story we may just say to ourselves, 'Well I know that' but maybe a better question is 'So what? What's that got to do with my life?'. To answer that, another question is necessary 'Why did Jesus die?'. Books have been written on this question and I have only a few lines to write here. But think of the Garden of Eden, the place where the first people that God had made lived, Adam and Eve. They rejected God, so couldn't live in his garden (or his kingdom) any more. Ever since, people have had a longing to be whole, but they know something is missing, something is not right. Many people try to fill this need with sex and drugs and rock and roll, but ultimately that leads to death not life. God sent his son Jesus to die on a cross in our place – we

deserved to die. But he rose again to new life so we too could share that new life and be reconciled to God if we wanted to. All we had to do was to repent – turn around be sorry for what we had done wrong and believe.

This message is summed up in John's gospel:

*'For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.'* (John 3.16).

This is what God is offering us this Easter – nothing less than eternal life, which begins not when we die but today. Take time this Easter to think about yourself, but also about the Good News which God offers in His Son Jesus Christ.

Have a very Happy and blessed Easter.

# ASTWOOD

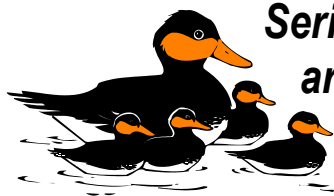

I often wonder how to start my little piece each month. Should I mention the weather, but of course you have all experienced the same as me so know already. What about the gardens and crops. The observant among you will already have looked at them, those not interested won't have bothered. I could mention the speeding traffic or the sad consequences which lie at the roadside edges for the carrion crows to clean up, but again you know that. So what shall I write about?

News from Chicheley seems a bit thin. I'm sure there must be lots of exciting things that have taken place or planned, it would be helpful if you would tell me. You will see the details for Good Friday teas and a St. Georges Night supper below, but are there other events you would like to tell us about? The details for the Easter church services you will find in SCAN but I would recommend the 6.00 am service on Easter Day at Chicheley church. This is a good way to begin the celebration of the most important day in the Christian church's year with the added treat of a full English breakfast for the worshippers in the village hall afterwards. How about coming along?

Chichchat will be on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April from 10.30am until noon in the village hall. There will be also be a ChichTea, with cakes, on April 22<sup>nd</sup> from 2.30pm until 4.00pm.

A smart new post and rail fence has been constructed behind the chestnut trees in the village centre. I remember many years ago a similar fence kept we village youths occupied balancing along the top rail. To traverse the whole length of the fence was quite a feat. Can iPhone and tablet computers match such simple pleasures? In March 1958 the construction of the first 55 miles of the M1 motorway began, which was completed by November the following year. The benefactors were Hester and John Bryan, John Cooper and Roger Hackett. (You can see where the road names in Crawley come from!) The charity originally known as Town Lands was founded in 1535. In 1906 the charities were all brought together as United Charities to be administered jointly for the good of the village.

The grants (which were originally for the purpose of helping apprentices purchase the tools of their trade) are still available for apprentices, but the trustees will consider anyone who is studying or training for a profession. Please note that the grants are only small, but they can be used to put toward the purchase of equipment, books or anything that may help anyone in their studies or training. If you feel you qualify for this, then please contact the trustees below who will let you know how to apply.

With Spring and the nice weather upon us, you may be encouraged to grow your own vegetables, fruit and flowers. We do have plots available. It is a fantastic hobby giving you plenty of exercise and you get to enjoy the fruits of your labour.

Finally, there are some vacant places for trustees to help administer the charity. This mainly involves attending three meetings per year.

## **NORTH CRAWLEY PARISH COUNCIL**

The Council met on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> March 2014

### **Planning**

There were no new applications this month except 14/00405/EIASCR which is a screening option request in respect of a proposed solar photovoltaic (PV) installation anticipated to generate 11-15 MWp of power at Hurst End Farm, Folly Lane, North Crawley

N.B. This is not a formal planning application at this stage, although the Clerk was requested to obtain the exact location of the proposed panels.

## **Ward Councillor's Report**

Cllr Mclean advised that there are 6 or 7 other screening option requests in for solar panels around this area at the present time.

Regarding pot holes, the gangs are out but the programme is ongoing with the constant wet weather. However, we must keep reporting them.

Cllr Mclean was thanked for his continued support.

### **Defibrillator update:**

Unfortunately, South East Ambulance Service was, yet again, unable to send personnel to give a talk/demonstration. The Clerk was asked to make enquiries elsewhere in order to move forward with this new project. The Parish Council thanked Ward Cllr Keith Mclean for his donation of £200 from his ward budget towards a defibrillator.

## **NAG Report**

Cllr Hunt reported that the new SID units are in the process of being installed; he will be attending the NAG meeting later this week and will have more to report next month

## **Councillor's Reports**

Residential safety – The traffic calming work agreed is scheduled to begin in the spring 2014

Dog fouling is still increasing as certain residents are allowing their dogs to foul outside the school; teachers are picking it up but not always before children have trodden in it.

Cllr Flower reported that the Institute Management Committee had decided to get quotes for a replacement wooden door for the front of the Institute rather than UPVC so that it is “in keeping” with the building as a whole. The Parish Council resolved to make a donation of £2000 to help with the various projects in progress for the Institute.

Cllr Hatton mentioned that fly tipping is still a problem, everyone is asked to be vigilant and report anyone seen doing this. She also stated that we should be aware of the possibility of “illegal raves” taking place in local farmer's fields and to report anything suspicious to the 101 Police non-emergency number.

Milton Keynes Council have allocated funds to purchase new grit bins for the winter it was, therefore, agreed to ask for two new ones, one to be sited in Orchard Way near the Anglian Water pumping station and the second outside the Institute to replace the old damaged one.

### **Questions from residents:**

A thank you was expressed that the footpath out of the village towards Cranfield has now been cleaned and is once again pleasant to walk along.

On Friday everyone, including our parents, certainly enjoyed a 'reading breakfast' of croissants, brioche, muffins, coffee, tea and juice.

'Billy's Bucket' by Kes Gray proved to be a very popular book during 'Book Week' as it was used as inspiration for story writing. The children were presented with their own bucket which they were asked to fill with 5 objects. This formed the basis for an imaginative speaking and listening and writing activities. The children invented some fantastic and creative stories from their props. However, it was not just fiction books which inspired children in Book Week. The EYFS children were treated to a visit from Rhys's daddy who is a pilot. The children were very impressed by the presentation and learnt lots of new information about aeroplanes and flight.





There was even more excitement as the week progressed when all the children and staff dressed as fairy tale characters and the school was overrun with dragons, princesses, wolves, princes and even a wizard!

As part of our ICT curriculum the children were given an empty picture frame and asked to take and print out a photograph on the theme **'All Things Bright and Beautiful'**. The results are fantastic; we have some budding photographers in our midst. Divine photographs of sunsets, colourful creatures, and spring flowers adorn the school and demonstrate the spirituality of our children.

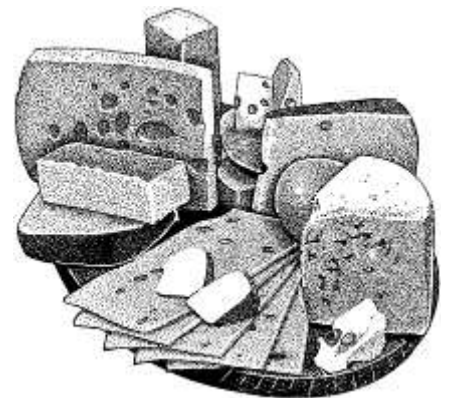

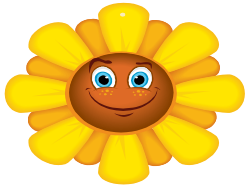

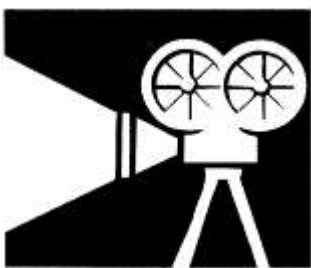

## ***Sherington Synopsis by Jack Daw***

Yet again the early part of the month and the end of February saw an incredible amount of rain falling and for the first time that I can remember the ditch in Church Road actually overflowed causing a bit of inundation in the road. There was also a lot of water running down the High Street which then ended up going down Water Lane. I was listening to someone at Sherington Nurseries who has a rain gauge and on the 28<sup>th</sup> February he measured a total of 22mm on that day! Latterly though it seems to have dried up a lot and no doubt there will soon be talk of a hosepipe ban.

It is good that the time has come to start planting things and I have some carrots, lettuce and radishes in the ground in my polytunnel. However, there was a disaster when just as they started to show themselves they were pretty much wiped out when slugs and/or snails consumed them and I had to replant, this time with the addition of slug pellets. I have also got some early spuds in the tunnel which I hope might be ready in mid May.

My attention was drawn to some goings on at the Village Hall playing field. The owners of the Old Rectory have taken down a lot of trees and to access the land they have, without permission, driven heavy machinery through the village hall car park and across the grass leaving quite deep tyre imprints. They have also removed fencing and hedging. We are aware that the land in question is part of the conservation zone and as such it is necessary to get planning approval to carry out such things. I understand the planning department of the council will be issuing an enforcement notice to the owners.

You will probably have read the notification in last month's Scan concerning the possible closure of our village shop following the present owners' decision to concentrate on running their Castlethorpe shop. It would be a great shame to lose this village facility which is well used and apparently a viable business. There will be a meeting in the Village Hall to discuss the situation at 11.30 on 12<sup>th</sup> April so if you have ideas or opinions please make sure that you are there.

I was sorry to hear of the death of Daisy Haynes on 1<sup>st</sup> March. Daisy was 91 and had not been in the best of health recently, however she died peacefully with her family around her. The funeral took place on 14<sup>th</sup> March at the church and was attended by 67 mourners. Daisy was a Newport girl and married Charlie when she was 20. The eulogy by Phil Smith was a revelation to many people and was really interesting.



During the second world war Daisy worked as an acetylene welder in a munitions factory in Newport Pagnell which since became the Aston Martin works. At that time the family had moved to Emberton and so she had to cycle in the cold dark mornings to work each day and because of the war lights on bicycles were not allowed. I bet that there are not many people who would do that nowadays. Rest in peace Daisy May Haynes.

## **SHERINGTON PARISH COUNCIL MARCH 2014**

### **1 CLERK'S REPORT**

**MKC Highways inspection update** The defects noted by MKC a month ago have been remedied but in the meantime several more have been reported. The repair in School Lane is temporary as a water leak has been identified.

**Bank Vault Storage** HSBC has confirmed that the nearest bank storage available for any valuable items would be in St Neots.

**Chicheley Hill Mound** The hand rail on the steps has been repaired. MKC has now confirmed that they are responsible for maintenance of the Mound and that Sherington PC can ask for the stockade to be repaired as well.

**Village bench repairs** Tony Pilcher has replaced missing wooden slats on two benches.

**Standing Orders.** Councillors approved changes to formatting and minor changes in wording as to frequency of meetings.

### **2 PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND DECISIONS**

**Alban Hill Nursery – Advert consent to display 3 x hoarding signs.**

While wishing to support local businesses, councillors raised concerns about the height and quantity of signs applied for.

**22 Crofts End** Councillors agreed that as the applicant was restoring the property according to MKC instructions, no further action was required.

### **3 SHERINGTON RECREATION GROUND**

**Pavilion survey and next steps** An onsite meeting took place on 19th February 2014 with the following present:- Cllr Denman, Cllr Sally Cook, clerk Wendy Austyn, Bob Cook from R C Builders, Dave King from Hygienic Interiors, Peter Burton, Alistair

McIntyre from Lune Architects, Jeff Charles, Martin Jeeves and Paul Bayliss from PSB Consultancy & Design. The surveyor has so far concluded from his two visits in December 2013 and February 2014 that limited but current evidence shows it is unlikely that water is coming up from under the ground nor through the wall from the sometimes flooded exterior path. There is also no current evidence that there is any fault with the construction of the building, damp proof course, damp proof membrane or second floor covering. The surveyor also so far concludes however that without removing the entire floor vinyl it is impossible to tell how much water is under the floor, exactly where it is, where it is coming from or why. Taking all this into consideration it was agreed to monitor the situation for several months until a prolonged period of dry weather has occurred, and then to ask the surveyor to return and carry out a further assessment.

**Management committee report** The legionella risk assessment contains several recommendations which will be discussed by the management committee.

**Shelters on recreation ground** The management committee has asked for the shelters to be removed. The clerk will obtain quotes to have them dismantled and the concrete slabs removed.

#### **4 WARD COUNCILLOR'S ITEMS**

Cllr McLean has passed on to MKC concerns expressed at the previous meeting about the size of buses passing through the village.

He had been contacted about recent flash flooding in Water Lane and had asked an MKC officer to attend the meeting. Although the officer was not present, she did confirm that she had sent an S81 notice to Anglian Water asking them to inspect the area. Cllr McLean urged residents to contact MKC emergency helpdesk in this type of situation.

#### **5 PUBLIC COMMENTS**

**Village shop** Nigel Blight, co-chair of Shopco, gave the parish council an update of the situation regarding the village shop, details of which have been posted in March SCAN. There will be a Village Meeting in the village hall to discuss this on Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> April at 11,30 am. The council agreed to support this and help with posters, flyers etc.

#### **6 DATES OF NEXT MEETINGS**

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7.30pm on Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014. The **Annual Parish Meeting** will be held on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> May 2014 in the Village Hall commencing at **7 pm**, followed by the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council at 7.30pm.

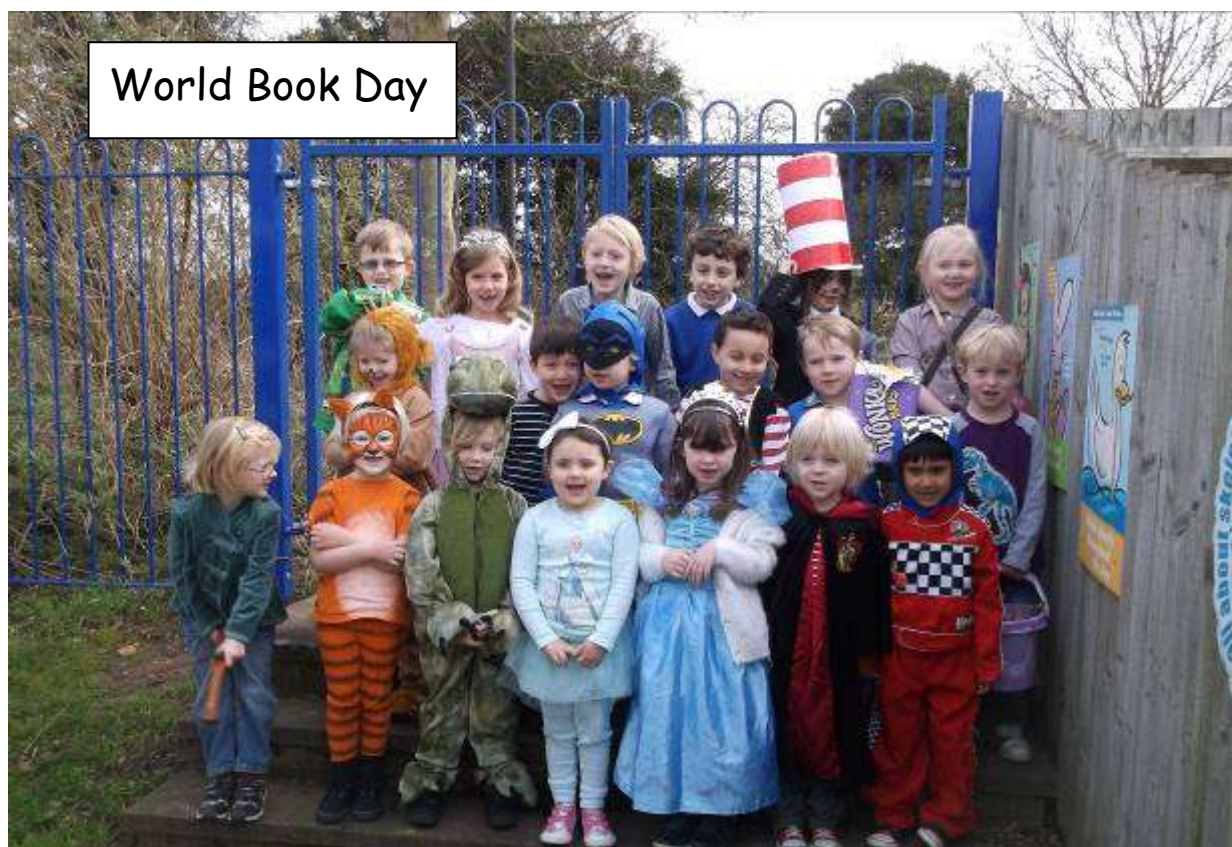

Here is Ian's helpful guide to those of you who are not familiar with all the technical procedures.

To make it as easy as possible for you to access SCAN online, we've made it available on two websites ('[sherington.org.uk](http://sherington.org.uk)' and '[issuu.com](http://issuu.com)') and in three different formats. Just choose whichever you find most convenient from the following options:

Use the link [www.sherington.org.uk/scan](http://www.sherington.org.uk/scan) to take you directly to the SCAN page where you will see three links to the current issue: '**PDF version**', '**Word version**', '**ISSUU version**'. Just click on the one you prefer. If you are not a 'computer geek' and do not understand technical terms such as 'PDF', don't worry, just click on each one and see what happens, then use the one you like best.

You can copy the PDF or Word versions to your own computer (for example, if you want to read it later) by **right-clicking** on the link (i.e. use the right button on your mouse instead of the left one) and then choose 'Save Target As...' from the pop-up menu. You can also print SCAN out to your own printer if you wish.

As well as the latest issue, you can access any previous online issues. Those available are listed in the right-hand column of the SCAN page.

If you are already on the Sherington web site, you will find '**SCAN**' is now in the main menu at the top of each page. You can use that to go to the SCAN page, or access the latest issue.

You can also access SCAN on the ISSUU website by going to [issuu.com/sherington](http://issuu.com/sherington) This is the Sherington home page and you will see pictures of the available SCAN issues across the middle of your screen. Just click on the one you wish to read. ISSUU is a global web site which now claims to have 10 million publications.
