


Hello All, welcome to July's edition, don't the months come around quickly?

But you shouldn't just always think of what God can do for you. I figure God put me here and he can take me back any time he pleases. And that's why I believe in God."



Chicheley celebrates H M Queen Elisabeth II 90th Birthday

In the afternoon of Saturday June 11th, the villagers from Chicheley were invited to assemble in the Shadow of St Laurence's Garden of Peace to celebrate One's very important Birthday. As it were, we were blessed with what seemed the only dry sunny and warm afternoon of an otherwise pretty soggy June. The main organisers were Felicity and David Robertson, David Blamires and Judy and Alan Plater. Everyone was invited to bring and share a plate or two of savoury and sweet confections. The centre piece of this affectionate gathering was the Birthday cake or, as it was, two Birthday cakes made and donated by Bobbie and Gordon Sparshot of Bedlam Walk. Our very own nonagenarian, Jo Duncombe, obliged us by cutting the cake. A toast was proposed by David Robertson to the good health of Her Majesty and this seems to have worked the trick as The Queen was in good form at Ascot Races this week even if her horses did not win.

ChichChat will continue as usual on the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Tuesday mornings in the village hall from 10.30 am until noon.

In 1916 the Battle of Verdun was still be fiercely fought and a great sea battle at Jutland had just taken place. On the 1st July the Somme Offensive began in France. That day will always be remembered as the worst day in history for losses by the British Army. There were 57,470 casualties of which 19,240 men were killed. The battle continued until 18th November and a number of Chicheley men were involved in the fighting.

On the 31st July George Reginald Brown was killed age 26 near Mametz, he was then a Private in the 1st Battalion Bedfordshire Regiment. George had been born in Chicheley in 1890, the seventh child to his mother who was widowed when he was two years old. A further child was born shortly afterwards. The family lived in a small three room cottage plus a kitchen and life would undoubtedly have been difficult. I have memories of that cottage in the early 1950's being still occupied by his brothers Johnny and Matty. It was near the Chester Arms, where a large chestnut tree now stands, was thatched and very dark and dingy. George had been a stable hand at Chicheley Hall looking after the horses and had joined the army as a volunteer some 17 months previously and would already have seen action. He had been a churchgoer, sang in the choir and also a bell ringer. The local bell ringers guild is planning to ring Chicheley's bells to commemorate his death so if you hear them around the end of July do think of him. George has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial.

NORTH CRAWLEY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Council met on Tuesday 07 June, 2016.

Planning

Cllr Rogers displayed the planning applications on the projector for all to see.

3 Crawley Grange, Pound Lane, consent was refused.
Plans for a workshop at Little Crawley Farm no adverse comments.
A single storey rear extension at 30 Folly Lane no adverse comments.

Cranfield Development. There is an outline planning application in with Bedford District Council for 198 houses in Crawley Rd, Cranfield. The Parish Council will oppose this mainly due to the extra volume of traffic through our village. Clerk will ensure we are kept updated with any developments.

Neighbourhood Plan

Cllrs Potts and Magee reported that the Steering Group meetings will be held monthly and that they will then update the Parish Council.

The first meeting is to be held in the Village Hall at 7pm on 27th June. Several people in the village have registered their interest to be involved in the Steering Group and all others who are interested are cordially invited.

Also attending this meeting is a Planning Officer from Milton Keynes Council, to provide us with an overview of the process and answer any questions, and the chairman of the Olney Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, to talk about their experience of Neighbourhood Planning.

Legally the plan must be Parish Council led although the village are involved in the Steering Group and will have significant influence. The Steering Group will be Cllrs Potts and Magee, a chair to be appointed from the village and six or seven other members.

Ward Councillor's Report

Cllr Peter Geary gave a report on behalf of all three Ward Councillors. There is not too much change following the elections but a new council plan will be agreed shortly.

Cllr Hatton asked Cllr Geary why we were not given notice or details about the resurfacing road closures to Cranfield and Newport Pagnell. He explained that MK Council are aware of the confusion regarding the recent road closures which were a fiasco. Ringway, the contractors, were at fault for not giving enough notice. Tom Blackburn-Maze has succeeded Mike Hainge as Services Director, Public Realm Service Group, and he will be coming around shortly to discuss and see any issues we have.

It was suggested to Cllr Geary that as all of the equipment and workers were in the area, that could they finally resolve the resurfacing desperately required in Chequers Lane. Cllr Geary said that the equipment being used for the main road was not suitable for this work and suggested that the Parish Council should contact Andy Dickinson for the rationale as to why Chequers Lane had not been resolved.

With regards to Plan:MK, Cllr Geary said that the Ward Councillors would obtain a draft of the plan in July which was due to report publically by the end of the year. He expressed concern that if the plan was sufficiently detailed, this would not give them enough time to work out the consequences for the Wards and Parishes in which case they would then be requesting a delay to allow time for perusal and consultation.

Finance Report - 07 June, 2015

Receipts: A total of £233.00.

Payments: A total of £1,812.62. This included £543.98 for grass cutting in May, the purchase of prizes and the hire of the bouncy castle for the Queen's birthday celebrations and all other expected items.

Accounts 2015/16 - The Annual Return and Accounts form had been received back from the Chartered Accountants following the internal audit and all had been found to be in order. The Annual Return would now be sent off to the External Auditor.

Churchyard Matters

Work to tidy the corner of the cemetery and to site a bench will hopefully start soon.

Website Update

RFO Sheila Bushnell has completed some great work and the website is now live, see northcrawley-pc.gov.uk.

RFO and Cllrs Potts suggested the possibility of having a Facebook link to our new website. Opinions on this were divided and it will be raised as a point on the next agenda.

Highways

There are still some bollards outstanding from the initial design. Cllr Hatton will meet with Rob Ward of MK Council regarding where we would like them sited.

Landscape

With the amount of sun and rain recently grass has grown at an extraordinary rate. A complaint was received from a resident concerning the state of the cemetery and a contractor has been contacted to resolve the issue.

Queen's Birthday Celebrations

This went very well and was a fantastic success; the weather was perfect and a good time had by all. A vote of thanks was expressed to everyone who worked tirelessly before, during and after the event, also those who donated items and who helped in any way, and all those who attended of course. Together we all made it a great success.

The Removal of the Flag

The recently replaced flag was removed without permission or explanation. The Parish Council allowed some time for it to be returned but on the fourth day when it had not been replaced the police were informed.

We have since found out that the flag was taken down for a different standard to be flown in celebration of a new born. The Parish Council are delighted and offer the family our heartfelt congratulations.



Sherington Neighbourhood Plan



July Update

The Sherington Neighbourhood Plan Draft has now reached a stage whereby we would like to get villagers agreement for it to be placed with Milton Keynes council for ratification and released public consultation. This will be the final stage before formally voting on the plan.

By adopting this Neighbourhood plan the Parish council aims to establish a vision for Sherington that helps to deliver the community's aspirations, wants and needs for the plan period 2016 to 2031.

The final draft version of the Neighbourhood Plan and the policies it contains will be published on the Parish Council website. There will be hard copies available from the Village Shop, or on request from Will Bush at Sherington House, Park Road.

Please take the time to read and absorb the details, and implications for further development contained within it.

Every effort has been made to ensure that the policies contained within the Neighbourhood Plan, reflect the views of the majority of Sherington residents. <u>Planning Policy Context</u>

Regardless of your views on development, our Neighbourhood Plan must demonstrate that it is consistent with the approach suggested by the National Planning Policy Framework and highlight the benefits offered to local people to ensure that they get the right types of development for their community.

It was accepted that the village would have to allocate additional housing development to comply with the Core Strategy, and this issue was brought to the fore by the approval, at appeal, of 36 houses on land adjacent to the High Street to the north of the village centre.

Therefore our Neighbourhood Plan <u>has</u> to allocate the land covered by this appeal decision and one other housing site, which would take the housing land supply for Sherington beyond that envisaged by the Core Strategy. It is considered that this robust approach once adopted, would <u>result in no further requirement to allocate any other additional housing sites.</u>

But ONLY once the plan has been ratified with a PUBLIC VOTE!
