Dear Friends,

The Olympics are in full swing as I write. I heard a little boy today celebrating someone's success, 'Yeah, a bronze, one of my favourite medals'. I love it! As my highest sporting achievement is watering the hanging baskets, I'm in awe of the skill, speed, strength, dexterity and most of all, the dedicated commitment of the athletes. The medal ceremonies are so moving as is the humility the athletes often show, but I can't help thinking of the one who came fourth or who didn't even make the final but who had put in the same years of dedicated training and whose families had made the same sacrifices. It was said of Joe Clarke, winner of the canoe slalom, and of others, that, though they had natural talent, it was their commitment which made all the difference.

This year I've spent much of my time working with wedding couples and baptism families. Weddings especially are not one-off events for me, but involve 5 or even 6 hours of preparation with each couple. Some of that is for the big day but most is spent in helping them face some of the big questions implied by their decision to get married. There is always laughter and sometimes tears as we explore what their commitment might mean as time goes on. Amongst other things, like who puts the bins out, I help them open up conversations about 'what if' questions such as loss of income, organ donation, making a will, who would care for the children in the event of an accident, or what they might do if they found they were expecting a disabled child. Painful subjects are better discussed long before the need arises than at the moment of tragedy. Commitment is serious stuff.

Jesus tells a little story about a man who, having found a treasure in a field, sells all he has to buy the field and own the treasure too. He was talking about, you've guessed, single minded commitment. The treasure he was meaning is the glorious truth of God's unconditional love and acceptance. It takes years of commitment to win Olympic gold, a life time to forge a marriage, but just a moment's humility to accept God's love and forgiveness. Mind you, it takes a lifetime commitment (there's that word again) of a different kind to explore the height and depth of His love. There are no medals, no first or last, no 'failure to qualify', and certainly no excessive physical activity, but we do need to be committed to working together in a loving community, to forgiving each other when we mess up and to learning from and with each other. Our 'individual event' of a life time, grasping what it means to know ourselves a beloved son or daughter of God is best worked out in a team.

ASTWOOD

We have had a couple of unpleasant incidents in the village over the last few weeks. One resident found an intruder in her house in the early hours of the morning, another returned home in the middle of the afternoon and appears to have disturbed burglars who had left with only a pillow case and a watch. Be vigilant, don't leave your windows open and take care.

Bob from the Old Swan has collected some archive material for Astwood. One photograph is of the building, which is now the kitchen of the Pub, with a carthorse being shod by farrier John Higgins from North Crawley. Another description of Astwood, written in about 1942, said "Astwood is a pleasant little village which remains singularly unspoiled by the passing of time and the scarifying finger of "progress"......it's hardly changed a bit! It would be fun to gather everyone's photographs and memories one evening, perhaps over a few glasses of wine?

One thing that may have changed since those days is the speed of the traffic passing through. The recent "smiley face speed indicator" produced some amazing statistics for traffic entering and leaving the village on the Bedford Rd and the Cranfield Rd. 71.5% of the cars were speeding, the average being 42 miles per hour but there were a significant number who were going over 70mph. Because of the number of cars speeding we will be expecting to see Police Speed Cameras in the village in the near future so Watch your Speed! Gill Marsden form Cranfield Rd is organising a MacMillan Coffee Morning in the Village Hall on Saturday 10th September from 9.30 till 12.30. ASTWOOD & HARDMEAD PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

Wednesday 10th August 2016 at 8pm in Astwood Village Hall

Present: Cllr R Stilton (Chair), Cllr D Hulance (Vice-Chair), Cllrs D Chapman, Cllr L Rhee, Cllr I Bradley, Ward Cllrs K McLean & P Geary, Clerk P Reynolds-Nunn, 1 member of the public.

Apologies: Ward Cllr D Hosking & Cllr L Noakes Apologies accepted.

Minutes of meeting on 11th May 2016 were adopted and signed as a true record

Matters arising from the last meeting- None.

<u>Hardmead Play Area</u> – Cllr Stilton reported that the new play equipment is complete, with the old equipment painted to match the new and being used by the children. We are still awaiting the siting of the new bench kindly donated by our ward councillors but Cllr Stilton wants to speak to Phil Snell first to check the proposed fixing into a concrete base. Clerk has added the equipment to our insurance and we have public liability insurance in the event of an accident. Once the bench is sited, it is planned to ask MK Mayor to officially open it.

<u>Village Hall report</u> – Cllr Hulance reported that the Village Hall was doing well as always with regular bookings of whist and Pilates. The fundraising is ongoing. Thanks go to the committee for the work at the hall and the village green garden which is looking nice.

Ward Cllr's report – Our ward councillors reported on three main items:-

1. MK 2050 – this is obviously in the early stages but was progressed on 20th July 2016, a new university is planned (MKIT) plans expected by October but site not

- yet decided on. It could take 16-20 years but MK are setting the seed for where they hope MK to be in 30-40 year's time. 400,000 residents are proposed by then, a growth of approximately 50%.
- 2. MINERALS LOCAL PLAN; This will not directly affect our villages, apart from possibly an extra 36 lorries a day passing along the A422 depending on which route is used. We can go to the public enquiry if we wish in mid-September. Our ward councillors feel it has not been looked into properly so are keeping a close eye on things as they progress.
- 3. CRANFIELD DEVELOPMENTS; North Crawley and Moulsoe amongst others took part in a meeting in Cranfield, backed by ward councillors covering Cranfield. A letter voicing all our concerns has been sent to Central Beds Council. Clerk was reminded to include declarations of interest in the agenda.

<u>NAG</u> – Cllr Hulance had attended the latest meeting which talked about speeding. He produced the statistics from the recent siting of the SID in Astwood which were surprisingly high; this will back up our case to maybe get police in the village with a speed camera. It is a positive step forward that we have at last joined the SIDS group, we will hopefully have the device again in approximately ten weeks time. Our ward councillors reported that Adrian Carden, our road safety officer, has left MK Council, they resolved to keep us informed of any news.

Planning:

No applications were pending at present, although several has been permitted since our last meeting.

The bus shelter was discussed again. The idea of moving the old bus shelter from Hardmead was dropped as felt it would fall apart when moved anyway, apart from looking a total eyesore. It was agreed that the clerk put a notice in SCAN asking if Astwood residents would like a new suitable bus shelter and if so, where would be a good place to site it (outside the church was suggested) If we did have one it would need to be in keeping with the village and obviously only if enough people use the buses and think we need one. We would only pursue this after consultation with the village via SCAN.

Cllr Rhee reported that the two drains outside The Close, Hardmead are totally blocked and need cleaning out to avoid flooding. It was also reported that flooding seemed to be occurring regularly on the corner of Cranfield Road and Main Road. Clerk will report these issues to highways.

Cllr Stilton mentioned that he would like as many parish councillors as possible to attend the opening of the play area. Clerk will buy some ribbon for the mayor to cut. Cllr Bradley produced a list of signatures from residents of Main Road to support the siting of an extra street light; now we know several are keen for this to be done, Clerk will pursue the matter regarding prices, maintenance, etc. It was suggested to install it adjacent to the new fence near the old barn (Elm Hall Farm).

AOB: None

Questions from the public: A resident mentioned speeding on the A422 which is a constant problem. There is little we can do apart from keep reporting it in the hope of getting a police speed camera occasionally. Clerk to action.

The traffic lights along the A422 are causing a nuisance; apparently it is to strengthen the bridge there, hopefully it will be completed within ten weeks.

The resident also mentioned the need of cutting right back of the bushes on the A422 main road when pulling out from the village; now that the bird nesting season is finished, Clerk will again report it to try to get it done. The visibility is always difficult when it needs trimming and it has all grown so quick with the weather this summer. Potholes in Cranfield Road are still bad; Clerk will report this yet again, although funds are limited for this work.

She had a wide knowledge of plants and was an enthusiastic gardener, having many conversations with my late mother-in-law, (who used to be Chicheley's SCAN correspondent), about their shared passion for all things in the garden. Pam will be much missed in the village and our condolences go to Dave and her family.

I would also like to record an appreciation of the life of Bill Leicester, or "bullfinch" to our SCAN readers. It is not always easy as we correspondents sit at our keyboard and try to produce a succinct report on our village happenings. Bill managed that really well, including the controversial items, and was always a pleasant and informative person to converse with. I, and I'm sure many others, will miss those occasions.

On a happier note congratulations to Pierre and Christine Girard who have just celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary. Also to report that the French Evening in their garden was much enjoyed, the weather being warm and the food tasty and ample as always.

For some time the Chicheley village hall committee has been discussing how they could improve the hall for its users. As they have very limited funds available after covering the essential costs of running the hall it was apparent that only by seeking assistance by way of grants could anything be achieved. Various applications have been made to grant making bodies with some success as detailed below.

A grant of £4,000 from the Milton Keynes Wind Farm Community Fund will enable replacement of all of the windows with double glazed units and two external doors. This work may well have been completed by the time this magazine has arrived with you.

The committee had also decided that a toilet suitable for use by the disabled should be a priority. To do this means altering the present arrangements in the entrance lobby. The opportunity would be taken to upgrade the remaining toilet and lobby area at the same time. They have been successful in obtaining grants of £5,000 from the MK Community Foundation, £500 from the Allchurches Trust Ltd and £350 from the discretionary grant budget of Cllr Hoskings. This together with another donation and some of the hall's own funds is now allowing the work to proceed. The plan is that it should be completed by the end of September.

The village hall committee is very grateful to these benefactors for their generosity, anyone involved in keeping such local facilities in operation will appreciate how important these grants are.

ChichChat will continue as usual on the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Tuesday mornings in the village hall from 10.30 am until noon. There may be some disruption due to the work in the lobby.

On the 1st October a Quiz will be held in the village hall for church funds. ORTH CRAWLEY NEWS AND COMMENT

Reviewing the previous Scan article rain appeared to be a major feature of the weather, and as we approached the middle of the summer thundery downpours continued to dampen outside activities such as picnics and barbeques. However more fitting seasonal weather arrived in July and we have had some real scorchers lately encouraging eating outdoors and relaxing in the garden, but quite a few people are now saying it is too hot. This I guess can be summed up by that old adage of 'You can please some of the people all of the time, you can please all of the people some of the time, but you can't please all of the people all of the time'.

The sad news has reached me that two of our more elderly and much respected citizens have passed away. Doris Collier was 5 days away from her 102nd birthday and at her funeral in St. Firmins church, much was spoken of her service to the Boswell family and her guardianship of the village hall. Some of her recollections were recorded on tape and are a very interesting insight into a bygone age.

Then in July Bill Leicester passed away at home after a spell in hospital with ill health. Bill was a real servant for the village being on various village committees and the Parish Council for many years, and of course being the infamous Bullfinch who wrote this article for countless years before somehow persuading me to pick it up. His insight and humour will be much missed.

I'm sure more detailed commemorations for the above two village characters can be found elsewhere in this copy of Scan.

Without wanting to scaremonger it is probably common knowledge that there has been a spate of burglaries in and around North Crawley and reports of others in Emberton. One of these incidents on the outskirts of our village involved strengthened glass windows being smashed with a concrete block, which in itself is a deeply disturbing violation to have suffered along with the removal of personal items of value. Obviously the forces of law and order are aware and will be doing what they can to catch the perpetrators, but in the meantime we must all make sure are properties are as safe as they can be by locking doors and windows etc. and also keeping an eye open for any unusual activity concerning our neighbours houses when we are out and about.

I believe the Parish Council are organising a meeting with Thames Valley Police for Friday 23rd September at 7.30pm to discuss the above and to suggest ways of deterring the criminal element and to take measures to improve the safety of your property. Further information about this meeting will be circulated by the PC.

There was a meeting in the village hall on 27 June to discuss a 'Neighbourhood Plan' (NP) for North Crawley which was attended by a number of villagers who had expressed an interest, plus two MKC representatives who gave a talk outlining what it is all about. A member of the Olney team who had recently gone through the process of establishing their plan also gave some advice on how to proceed and pitfalls to avoid. It was made quite clear that a NP is a local plan for a specified area, so has little to do with a strategic plan such as MK expansion. In other words we may need two strategies, one for the NP, and if our community requires it one for MK expansion.

The next point I picked up on was that a NP needs the support of villagers through a referendum, the details of how this would be staged and what qualifies as a winning percentage for or against was not made clear. My own view is that it might be an idea to build a small number of affordable houses (starter / retirement / some rentable) properties but we would have to be aware of impacts on the school, and infrastructure considerations such as drainage, sewage, current overhead power lines, and possibly the introduction of gas. I certainly do not entertain the idea of just building some houses without the village generally seeing some benefit. Bear in mind none of the above would protect the village from a strategic project initiated by the unitary authority, so perhaps we should be creative and come up with ideas that would provide the village with some level of protection. Just an idea, but what about establishing a heritage green belt based on all of the local footpaths that criss-cross the country side and link us to Cranfield, Moulsoe, Astwood, Chicheley and in the Newport Pagnell direction the other side of Tickford farm. Perhaps this is a shot in the dark but it might be possible with help from various countryside friendly organisations to designate this area as no-build and preserve green spaces for future generations.

North Crawley Cricket Club.

The cricket season is now in full swing and the first few results have not been as good when compared to previous seasons. However, a crushing victory of second place New Bradwell on 11 June and a further win against top side Eaton Bray in July, will hopefully boost the first team for the remainder of the season. The club has attracted some new players at all levels this season and the Junior section is thriving. Which reminds me, congratulations to Ben and Louise Howkins who have had their first child, who in their second week of being born attended a NC cricket match.

A story has also come my way from a dubious source, regarding former first team player Tufty Stackpole who allegedly smashed an incredible 636 for a team on the first day of their County Championship match. This broke Brian Lara's previous world record 501 not out, and the MCC Long room at Lords based Stackpole said, 'I'm sure Lara will take the news very well and records are there to be broken'. A media spokesman is quoted as saying 'Forget player of the match, Tufty Stackpole is the player of the century'.

Planning

Cranfield Development –The Parish Council have agreed to oppose planning application for 190 houses in Bourne End / Crawley Road and a request to Mid Beds Council will be made for a Traffic Management Plan to be put in place.

Neighbourhood Plan

Cllr Potts reported that she had met with MP Mark Lancaster who offered his full support. A resident of the village, Matthew Chinn was appointed Chair of the steering group and we are delighted to have him onboard. CALLING ALL RESIDENTS - The next meeting will be on Monday 12th September in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. It is extremely important we have more volunteers please come along and support our village or contact esther.potts@outlook.com for more information.

Ward Councillor's Report

Cllr Keith McLean gave his report stating that the Director of Public Realm is visiting shortly and advised us to make a list of issues that we can show him with a view to getting them dealt with.

MK FUTURES 2050; A commission has been launched to explore where MK want to be by 2050. MK has a population of 268,000 at present; the projection is 40,000 by 2050. This requires better use of grid roads etc. We have an art gallery, an international festival and aim to be a city of culture by 2023. On 20th July 2016, MK Council will "adopt" this report, and anyone can comment via the website, MK Futures 2050.

PLAN:MK: This is ongoing but it could be early 2017 before MKC can produce the next document.

Churchyard Issues/Risk Register

Cemetery – A site meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 19th July 2016 at 7.30pm to tidy up the Garden of Rest allowing two weeks notice for relatives to remove anything not in keeping with the rules of the Churchyard and Garden of Rest from the graves. The next phase will be to tidy up the Churchyard i.e check for loose headstones and remove anything not in keeping with the Rules and Regulations of the Churchyard.

The war memorial is completed and looking excellent.

Residential Safety:

Cllr Hatton met with MK Council regarding more bollards in the High Street, to prevent vehicles mounting the pavement. In the meantime, it is recommended to dial 101 and report any traffic issues no matter how small, giving the registration number of the offending vehicle so that we can work with the police to build up a pattern to take appropriate action.

Councillors Items

Cllr Potts had been informed that the bus shelter floor flooded and people are smoking there. The clerk will obtain some "no smoking" signs to display there as it is illegal to smoke in a bus shelter with a roof and sides.

She also reported that the traffic has increased hugely in Gog Lane, Little Crawley and Cllr Hatton will raise this issue with MKC.

Cllr Stapleton reported several problems with excess rain and blocked drains which will be reported to MKC. The drain on the waste ground that needs cementing, Anglian Water will be contacted.

Cllr Stapleton has compiled a report of street furniture, bins, notice boards etc stating which items need attention. The report will be reviewed quarterly.

Now that we have a new Union Jack, villagers wishing to raise a different flag, should first seek permission from the Parish Council. Political flags will not be given permission.

There have been several house burglaries in the village recently, mostly in daylight hours. PC Andy Hipkin and Cllr Hatton, will arrange a village meeting in September to alert people to safety measures regarding break-ins. We are advised to ALWAYS dial 101 if we see something we are not happy with. Date of meeting to be advised on website.

Questions from Residents

A resident made a proposal for within the cemetery. He would like to have a small area of ground set aside for wild flowers for the bees, birds and butterflies to enjoy near where we are proposing to tidy and have a seat/bench sited. The request will be put on the agenda for discussion at the next Parish Council meeting.

NEWS FROM NORTH CRAWLEY CE SCHOOL



North Crawley CE School & Stoke Goldington CE First Schoo 'Together in Learning - Sharing Excellence and Expertise'




